Our mission is to develop and deliver programs that increase food growing and food security for people of Tofino and surrounding communities. We share a vision of thriving and resilient coastal communities with access to an abundance of healthy local food and an awareness of what can be grown and harvested.

The Tofino Community Food Initiative conducts its programs on the ancestral, unceded territories of the Tla-o-qui-aht First Nations. We acknowledge that the practices we draw on and teach are not traditional to this place and that, with colonization, Indigenous people lost access to the land on which we live and work. The TCFI is committed to cultural inclusion and reconciliation, and to stewarding the land on which we are guests.

2022 was a year of re-emergence. After two years of pandemic restrictions, we were able to meet again in person, to share seeds, ideas, and knowledge, and to build community around growing food in our region. This year saw the return of Seedy Saturday and the edible garden tours in Tofino and Ucluelet, and we had a new event-fittingly it was a celebration, our first harvest celebration. On that sunny fall day over 100 people came together for soup and treats, to tour the school garden and food forest and learn about the school garden program, to share ideas about local seed saving, and to have fun as a community. It was heartening to see such community support and engagement coalescing at gardens tended by our children and seniors, with support from a great team of volunteers of all ages.





In 2022, our garden coordinator, Paula Robertson, worked closely with the school administration and educators to deliver a comprehensive program of in-class and in-garden activities for eight classes. As well, she delivered two afterschool programs and ran a successful intergenerational program, with seniors working alongside children in the classroom and garden. The children grew everything from radishes and peas to rhubarb and fennel, and enjoyed making soup, veggie sandwiches, salads, and herbal teas from their produce.

This year, we also worked with Grace George (aka Grandma Grace), First Nations support worker at Wickaninnish Community School, to incorporate Indigenous learning into our programming. This included creating Nuu-chah-nulth language plant signs.

The school garden program was bolstered by the donation of a greenhouse from the Kirkwood family, and a financial donation from Meg Stewart for the purchase of four metal troughs, which we fashioned into raised beds. The program also received substantial additions to our garden infrastructure from the estate of Nancy Powis, including grow towers, water catchment barrels, and planters.

This highly successful program is administered and funded entirely by the TCFI and is supported through grants and donations. Thank you to everyone who has supported this program in myriad ways.

Grow Local Workshops

With support of an Island Health
Community Wellness Grant, as
well as funding from Ocean Outfitters,
we were able to offer several workshops
and events that engaged west coast
communities around food growing and
preservation, and food security. Organized by
Leah Ungstad, workshops included winter
seed sowing, plant propagation, seed saving,
and fruit tree pruning, as well as a boiling
water bath canning workshop in which
participants made cranberry sauce using
cranberries harvested in Ahousaht.

Two of our workshops had long waitlists which helped inform which topics were most sought after. Through a feedback survey, we also learned more of what topics, price points, and delivery styles community members are most interested in for future

workshop offerings.

In the Community

Board and staff continue to engage in various ways in the community to work towards our mission and vision around food growing and food security. In the spring, board, staff, and volunteers grew plant starts to sell at Gaia Grocery. This is a great fundraiser, but is also a way to share varieties of plants not often found through nurseries. We also held a kelp pickle canning "party" in preparation for sale at the holiday market. We've been making these kelp pickles for over a decade as a fundraiser and they're always a hit.

The TCFI regularly participates in meetings around regional food security, including the Coastal Agricultural Roundtable convened by the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District (ACRD), the Clayoquot Biosphere Trust, and Eat West Coast. This roundtable shares knowledge related to food production, harvesting, and access on the west coast and helps shape ACRD policies.
